

ROLE OF CREDIBLE INTELLIGENCE IN ENHANCING INTERNAL SECURITY OPERATIONS IN NIGERIA: A CRITICAL ANALYSIS

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ABSTRACT: This study examines how credible intelligence contributes to improving internal security operations in Nigeria. Despite the presence of several security agencies, such as the Department of State Services (DSS), Force Intelligence Department (FID), Directorate of Military Intelligence (DMI), Directorate of Naval Intelligence (DNI), Air Intelligence Division (AID), Directorate of Intelligence and Investigation (DII) and the Defence Intelligence Agency (DIA), Nigeria continues to experience serious security threats, including terrorism, insurgency, banditry, and kidnapping. The research highlights how timely, accurate, and reliable intelligence can help prevent attacks, guide security operations, and improve coordination among agencies. It explores the main types of intelligence used – Human Intelligence (HUMINT), Signals Intelligence (SIGINT), and Open Source Intelligence (OSINT) – and how they support decision-making in security matters. The study also identifies key challenges facing intelligence operations, such as poor inter-agency collaboration, lack of modern technology, limited funding, and low community trust. Through real-life examples and case studies, the study examined the benefits of intelligence-led security efforts and the risks of faulty intelligence. The study concludes with recommendations to improve intelligence gathering and use, including creating a central coordination agency, involving communities more effectively, investing in technology, and strengthening international partnerships. These steps are necessary to build a safer and more secure Nigeria.

INTRODUCTION

Nigeria, known as the "giant of Africa," is grappling with a severe and ongoing internal security crisis that jeopardizes its stability, growth, and unity. The country's large population, rich array of ethnic and religious groups, and vast geographical landscape contribute to its vulnerability to a variety of intricate and changing security challenges. These challenges range from terrorism and insurgency to kidnapping, armed banditry, communal violence, and cybercrime, all of which have surged in both frequency and severity in recent years (Ivorgba, 2024). As a consequence, many Nigerians live in fear and face displacement, which has greatly hindered economic progress, particularly in areas like the northeast, northwest, and southeast (Ezeabasili, 2025; Musa et al., 2024).

For instance, the Boko Haram insurgency, which started in 2009, has led to the loss of tens of thousands of lives and has forced millions from their homes, resulting in one of the most serious humanitarian crises in Africa. In addition, a rise in banditry and mass abductions in northern Nigeria has crippled local economies and strained law enforcement, making the situation even more dire (Olowonihi & Musa, 2024). Various factors, such as high unemployment, weak governance, widespread poverty, and feelings of marginalization, contribute to the unrest, creating an environment where radicalization and violence can thrive (Musa et al., 2024; Nwagboso et al., 2024).

In facing these complex challenges, having a strong and responsive internal security framework is crucial. A vital element of this framework is credible intelligence. When it is timely, accurate, and actionable, intelligence empowers security agencies to anticipate attacks, dismantle criminal organisations, and respond swiftly to emerging threats. It acts as the "eyes and ears" of the government, providing early warnings that can significantly reduce the human and economic toll of insecurity. However, in Nigeria, the intelligence sector has consistently struggled to meet these demands, hindered by institutional weaknesses, poor collaboration among agencies, and a lack of investment in modern surveillance technologies (Awotayo et al., 2023).

This study is based on the conviction that credible intelligence is a central element in Nigeria's pursuit of internal security, rather than just a supplementary tool but a central pillar in Nigeria's quest for internal security. By examining the obstacles to effective intelligence utilisation and investigating ways to enhance its application, the study aims to offer significant insights for policy reform and operational enhancement.

Statement of the Problem

For decades, Nigeria has pursued security reforms and created several intelligence and law enforcement agencies, including the Department of State Services (DSS), the Nigerian Police Force (NPF), and the Defence Intelligence Agency (DIA). Yet, the country still finds itself facing alarming and relentless security challenges. This troubling situation prompts critical questions: How is it possible for a nation with such a wide array of security forces to continue experiencing large-scale violence, frequent prison breaks, and acts of terrorism?

A striking illustration of Nigeria's intelligence shortcomings is the 2022 Kuje prison attack, during which more than 800 inmates, including prominent terrorism suspects, escaped during a meticulously planned assault. This incident laid bare serious weaknesses in the country's capabilities for intelligence gathering, sharing vital information, and thwarting potential threats before they could escalate (Wikipedia, 2023). Similar deficiencies have been noted in responses to rampant banditry in Zamfara, widespread abductions in Kaduna, Imo, Anambra and several other states, and several attacks targeting government institutions. These troubling occurrences not only point to operational missteps but also highlight a more significant systemic problem: Nigeria's intelligence framework tends to be reactive rather than proactive, failing to anticipate and mitigate threats before they occur.

This persistent insecurity has eroded public confidence in the state's ability to protect its citizens. More critically, it emboldens criminal actors who exploit the gaps in surveillance, inter-agency collaboration, and strategic planning. The inability to effectively predict or preempt attacks suggests a disconnect between intelligence production and its utilisation in security operations.

Therefore, there is a compelling need to examine the strategic value of credible intelligence in the Nigerian context. What structural or institutional challenges limit its impact? How can intelligence be better harnessed to prevent crimes before they occur? This study seeks to provide a critical analysis of these questions, offering evidence-based recommendations that can strengthen internal security operations and restore public trust.

Research Objectives

This study aims to:

1. Examine the role of credible intelligence in internal security management in Nigeria.
2. Analyze the effectiveness of Nigeria's intelligence system in addressing security threats.
3. Identify the constraints to intelligence-led security operations.
4. Propose recommendations to enhance the efficacy of intelligence in internal security operations.

Research Questions

To guide the study, the following research questions are posed:

1. What is the role of credible intelligence in internal security management in Nigeria?
2. How effective is Nigeria's intelligence system in tackling security threats?
3. What are the constraints hindering intelligence-led security operations?
4. What strategies can be implemented to enhance the effectiveness of intelligence in internal security?

Significance of the Study

The significance of this study lies in its potential to contribute to both academic discourse and practical policy formulation. Academically, it provides a comprehensive analysis of the interplay between intelligence and internal security in Nigeria. Practically, the study offers insights and recommendations that can inform policymakers and security agencies in their efforts to strengthen intelligence operations and, by extension, internal security.

Scope and Limitations

The study focuses on the role of credible intelligence in enhancing internal security operations in Nigeria, with particular attention to developments from 2011 to 2023. It examines various security challenges, including terrorism, insurgency, banditry, and cybercrime. While the study draws on a range of sources, including academic literature, government reports, and media accounts, it is

limited by the availability and reliability of data, especially concerning classified intelligence operations.

Conceptual Clarifications and Theoretical Framework

Credible Intelligence

Credible intelligence refers to information that is accurate, reliable, and timely, enabling decision-makers to take informed actions to safeguard national interests. It involves the systematic collection, analysis, and dissemination of information to anticipate and counter threats. In the context of Nigeria, credible intelligence is vital for addressing complex security challenges such as terrorism, insurgency, and organised crime (Olowonihi & Musa, 2024).

Internal Security

Internal security encompasses the measures taken by a state to maintain peace and order within its borders. It involves protecting citizens, institutions, and infrastructure from threats such as terrorism, insurgency, and criminal activities. Effective internal security ensures the stability and continuity of governance and societal functions (Nwagboso & Nwagboso, 2021).

National Security Architecture

National security architecture refers to the framework of institutions, policies, and strategies designed to protect a nation's sovereignty and interests. It includes the coordination among various security agencies, legislative frameworks, and resource allocation to address security challenges. In Nigeria, this architecture comprises entities like the Department of State Services (DSS), the Nigerian Police Force (NPF), and the Nigerian Armed Forces, among others (Awotayo et al., 2023).

Types and Sources of Intelligence

Human Intelligence (HUMINT)

HUMINT involves gathering information through interpersonal contact. It includes data collected from human sources, such as informants, defectors, or undercover agents. This form of intelligence is crucial for understanding the intentions and capabilities of adversaries. In Nigeria, HUMINT has been instrumental in counterinsurgency operations, especially in the northeastern region (Nwagboso & Nwagboso, 2021).

Signals Intelligence (SIGINT)

SIGINT pertains to the interception of electronic signals, including communications and non-communication signals. It provides insights into the plans and movements of adversaries by analyzing intercepted messages and electronic emissions. The Nigerian military's acquisition of

advanced surveillance equipment has enhanced SIGINT capabilities in recent years (Reuters, 2024).

Open Source Intelligence (OSINT)

OSINT involves collecting information from publicly available sources, such as media reports, academic publications, and online content. It is valuable for corroborating information obtained through other intelligence disciplines and for gaining a broader understanding of the operational environment. The rise of social media has significantly expanded the scope of OSINT in Nigeria (Olowonihi & Musa, 2024).

Theoretical Framework

Realist Theory

Realist theory in international relations posits that the primary concern of states is survival in an anarchic international system. States prioritise their security and power, often leading to competition and conflict. This perspective underscores the importance of a robust intelligence apparatus to anticipate and counter threats. In Nigeria, the realist approach emphasizes the need for a strong state capable of maintaining internal order (Nwagboso & Nwagboso, 2021).

Systems Theory

Systems theory views security as a complex system comprising interrelated components, including agencies, policies, and processes. It emphasizes the need for coordination and integration among these components to effectively address security challenges. Applying systems theory to Nigeria's security architecture highlights the importance of inter-agency collaboration and information sharing (Awotayo et al., 2023).

Intelligence Cycle Theory

The intelligence cycle theory outlines the process of intelligence operations, comprising planning and direction, collection, processing, analysis, dissemination, and feedback. This cyclical process ensures that intelligence activities are systematic and responsive to the needs of decision-makers. In Nigeria, challenges in the intelligence cycle, such as delays in information dissemination and lack of feedback mechanisms, have hindered effective security operations (Olowonihi & Musa, 2024).

The Role of Credible Intelligence in Enhancing Internal Security Operations in Nigeria

The security situation in Nigeria is increasingly complex, marked by various challenges such as insurgency, banditry, kidnapping, and communal conflicts. To navigate this landscape, there is an urgent need for a strong and effective intelligence framework. Credible intelligence is essential; it serves as the foundation for both proactive and reactive security strategies, allowing security agencies to not only anticipate and prevent potential threats but also to respond swiftly when

incidents occur. This section explores the crucial role that reliable intelligence plays in strengthening internal security operations across Nigeria.

Credible intelligence plays a crucial role in anticipating potential security threats and executing preventive strategies. By analysing patterns, behaviours, and communications, intelligence agencies can effectively identify and neutralise threats before they actualise. For example, the Nigerian Armed Forces, in collaboration with the Multinational Joint Task Force (MNJTF), successfully neutralised 13,543 terrorists and criminals and rescued nearly 10,000 hostages between May 2023 and February 2025 (Onje, 2025).

Moreover, intelligence gathering enables the identification of emerging threats, such as the evolution of criminal gangs into organised insurgent groups. Early detection through intelligence allows for timely interventions, thereby mitigating the impact of such threats on national security. Intelligence plays a critical role in enhancing the efficiency of security operations. It provides security agencies with the necessary information to plan and execute operations with precision. For example, the Nigerian military's rescue of 137 abducted students in Kaduna without any confrontation underscores the effectiveness of intelligence-led operations (Adetayo, 2024).

Furthermore, intelligence facilitates the optimal allocation of resources by identifying high-risk areas and prioritising them for intervention. This targeted approach ensures that limited resources are utilised effectively, leading to improved security outcomes.

Effective intelligence sharing among security agencies is vital for a coordinated response to security threats. The lack of synergy among Nigeria's security agencies has often resulted in operational inefficiencies and intelligence failures. Enhancing inter-agency collaboration through shared intelligence platforms can bridge these gaps and foster a unified approach to internal security. The establishment of joint task forces and inter-agency committees has been proposed as a means to facilitate intelligence sharing and collaborative planning. Such structures can enhance the collective capacity of security agencies to address complex security challenges.

Community engagement is a critical component of intelligence gathering, particularly in regions where formal intelligence structures are limited. Human Intelligence (HUMINT), derived from community interactions, provides valuable insights into local dynamics and potential threats. The Civilian Joint Task Force (CJTF) in Borno State exemplifies the effectiveness of community-based intelligence in combating insurgency. However, the success of HUMINT relies on the trust between security agencies and local communities. Building this trust requires consistent engagement, protection of informants, and addressing grievances that may hinder cooperation.

Despite its importance, intelligence gathering in Nigeria faces several challenges. These include inadequate funding, lack of technological infrastructure, and insufficient training of personnel. Additionally, the prevalence of misinformation and the use of human shields by insurgents' complicate intelligence operations, often leading to unintended civilian casualties. Addressing these challenges necessitates a comprehensive reform of the intelligence sector, focusing on capacity building, technological advancement, and the establishment of ethical guidelines to govern intelligence operations.

To understand the practical application and impact of credible intelligence on internal security operations in Nigeria, it is essential to examine specific case studies. These instances highlight how intelligence has been utilised to counter various security threats, including insurgency, banditry, and separatist movements. In response to escalating banditry in the northwestern region, the Nigerian Army launched Operation Forest Sanity in 2023 (Lashem, 2023). This operation aimed to dismantle bandit camps and restore security in affected areas. Intelligence played a pivotal role in identifying the locations of these camps and planning targeted assaults. For instance, in Katsina State, intelligence reports led to the successful raid of a notorious bandit enclave, resulting in the neutralisation of several bandits and the recovery of arms and ammunition. The operation's success underscored the importance of timely and accurate intelligence in addressing security challenges.

The Nigeria Hunter and Forest Security Service (NHFSS), which was established in 2021, has emerged as a vital contributor to the country's internal security framework (Bella & Olanrewaju, 2024). By harnessing local insights and fostering community involvement, the NHFSS has played a pivotal role in collecting human intelligence (HUMINT) aimed at tackling issues like insurgency and banditry, especially in the dense forests of Nigeria. Their partnerships with various security agencies have resulted in noteworthy achievements, including the safe rescue of kidnapping victims in Anambra State and significant disruptions to bandit operations in the North-West region. The NHFSS's success not only highlights the importance of community engagement in intelligence gathering but also underscores the effectiveness of incorporating grassroots knowledge into comprehensive security strategies.

While intelligence has facilitated numerous successful operations, there have been instances where flawed intelligence led to tragic outcomes. In September 2024, a Nigerian military airstrike in Kaduna State, based on intelligence reports, mistakenly targeted a mosque, resulting in the deaths of at least 24 civilians (Muhammad & Kingimi, 2024). The incident highlighted the dire consequences of inaccurate intelligence and the need for rigorous verification processes. Similarly, in the northwest region, airstrikes intended to neutralize insurgents have occasionally resulted in civilian casualties due to misidentification of targets. These incidents underscore the critical importance of ensuring the credibility and accuracy of intelligence to prevent collateral damage.

In the fight against Boko Haram and ISWAP in the northeastern region, intelligence has been a cornerstone of military strategy. Operations in the Sambisa Forest, guided by intelligence reports, have led to the elimination of key insurgent leaders and the rescue of numerous captives (Uduo, 2025). For example, in May 2024, Nigerian forces, acting on intelligence, killed Boko Haram commander Tahir Baga and rescued 386 captives from insurgent camps (Daily Trust, 2025). These successes demonstrate how credible intelligence can significantly weaken insurgent capabilities and restore security in affected areas.

Notwithstanding these successes, challenges persist in Nigeria's intelligence apparatus. Issues such as inter-agency rivalry, lack of coordination, and inadequate technological infrastructure hinder the effective collection and dissemination of intelligence. Moreover, the infiltration of security agencies by criminal elements compromises the integrity of intelligence operations. Addressing these challenges requires comprehensive reforms, including the establishment of centralized

intelligence databases, enhanced inter-agency collaboration, and investment in advanced surveillance technologies.

Challenges to Effective Intelligence Gathering and Utilization in Nigeria

Despite the critical role of intelligence in enhancing internal security operations, Nigeria faces significant challenges in gathering and utilizing credible intelligence. These challenges stem from systemic issues, infrastructural deficits, inter-agency rivalries, and socio-political complexities. This section explores these impediments in detail, providing insights into their implications for national security.

1. **Infrastructural and Technological Deficits:** One of the primary challenges in intelligence gathering in Nigeria is the lack of adequate infrastructural and technological resources. Many security agencies operate with outdated equipment, limited surveillance capabilities, and insufficient data management systems. This technological gap hampers real-time intelligence collection and analysis, leading to delayed or ineffective responses to security threats. For instance, the Nigerian military's reliance on aerial surveillance without precise ground intelligence has resulted in tragic incidents. In December 2023, a drone strike in Tudun Biri, Kaduna State, intended to target bandits, mistakenly hit a village, killing at least 88 civilians. This incident underscores the dangers of operating with inadequate intelligence verification mechanisms (AP News, 2023).
2. **Inter-Agency Rivalries and Lack of Coordination:** The Nigerian security architecture comprises multiple agencies, including the military, police, Department of State Services (DSS), and various paramilitary organisations. However, these agencies often operate in silos, with limited coordination and information sharing. Inter-agency rivalries, competition for resources, and lack of a unified command structure impede the effective utilisation of intelligence. This fragmentation was evident during the counterinsurgency operations in the Northeast, where overlapping mandates and poor communication among agencies led to operational inefficiencies. The absence of a centralised intelligence database further exacerbates these challenges, resulting in duplicated efforts and missed opportunities for proactive interventions.
3. **Human Intelligence (HUMINT) Limitations:** Human Intelligence (HUMINT) is vital for understanding local dynamics and gathering actionable information. However, in Nigeria, HUMINT faces several obstacles, including community mistrust, fear of reprisals, and inadequate protection for informants. The lack of community engagement strategies and failure to address grievances have eroded public confidence in security agencies. The Civilian Joint Task Force (CJTF) in Borno State has demonstrated the potential of community-based intelligence. However, without institutional support and safeguards, such initiatives remain vulnerable to exploitation and may inadvertently contribute to human rights abuses (Wikipedia, 2025).
4. **Political Interference and Corruption:** Political interference and corruption within security agencies undermine the integrity of intelligence operations. Instances of intelligence being manipulated for political gains or suppressed to protect vested interests are not uncommon. Such practices erode public trust and compromise the effectiveness of security interventions. Moreover, corruption within the ranks of security agencies can lead

to the leakage of sensitive information, endangering operations and personnel. Addressing these issues requires robust oversight mechanisms, transparency, and accountability within the intelligence community.

5. **Legal and Policy Framework Deficiencies:** Nigeria's legal and policy frameworks governing intelligence operations are often outdated or inadequate. The absence of comprehensive legislation delineating the roles, responsibilities, and oversight of intelligence agencies creates ambiguities and overlaps. This legal vacuum hinders the development of standardised procedures and accountability mechanisms. Furthermore, the lack of data protection laws raises concerns about privacy and civil liberties, potentially deterring public cooperation in intelligence gathering. Reforming the legal framework to align with international best practices is essential for enhancing the credibility and effectiveness of intelligence operations.
6. **Socio-Cultural Barriers:** Nigeria's diverse socio-cultural landscape presents unique challenges to intelligence gathering. Ethnic, religious, and linguistic differences can impede communication and foster mistrust between security agencies and local communities. Understanding and navigating these complexities requires cultural sensitivity, local knowledge, and inclusive engagement strategies. For example, in the fight against banditry in the Northwest, failure to engage Fulani communities constructively has limited the flow of intelligence and fuelled perceptions of marginalisation. Building bridges across cultural divides is crucial for fostering cooperation and enhancing intelligence capabilities.

The challenges to effective intelligence gathering and utilisation in Nigeria are multifaceted, encompassing infrastructural deficits, inter-agency rivalries, human resource limitations, political interference, legal ambiguities, and socio-cultural complexities. Addressing these issues necessitates a holistic approach that includes technological investment, institutional reforms, community engagement, legal modernisation, and cultural competence. Strengthening the intelligence framework is imperative for enhancing internal security operations and safeguarding national stability.

The Role of Community-Based Intelligence and Civilian Participation

Community-based intelligence (CBI) and civilian participation are crucial for enhancing Nigeria's internal security operations. Studies highlight the need for improved inter-agency cooperation, technology integration, and community engagement in intelligence operations to address security challenges (Olowonihi & Musa, 2024). Community policing is identified as an effective approach to alleviate internal security crises by fostering collaboration between citizens and security agents (Sarafa & Monday, 2023). In Nigeria, where security challenges are multifaceted and deeply rooted in local contexts, leveraging the knowledge and cooperation of local communities can significantly improve intelligence gathering and utilisation. This section explores the importance, mechanisms, and challenges of CBI and civilian involvement in Nigeria's internal security landscape.

CBI involves the active participation of community members in identifying and reporting security threats. This approach is particularly effective in Nigeria due to the country's diverse ethnic,

cultural, and geographical landscape. Local residents possess intimate knowledge of their environments, making them valuable assets in detecting unusual activities and potential threats. For instance, the Civilian Joint Task Force (CJTF) in Borno State has played a pivotal role in combating Boko Haram insurgents by providing actionable intelligence to security forces. Their efforts have led to the arrest of numerous insurgents and the rescue of kidnapped victims. The CJTF's success underscores the potential of community involvement in enhancing security operations (Gulyás, 2023).

Mechanisms for Civilian Participation

Several mechanisms facilitate civilian participation in intelligence gathering:

1. **Community Policing:** This strategy involves collaboration between the police and community members to identify and address security concerns. Community policing fosters trust and encourages information sharing, leading to more effective crime prevention and resolution.
2. **Neighbourhood Watch Programs:** These programs empower residents to monitor and report suspicious activities in their areas. By fostering a sense of collective responsibility, neighbourhood watch initiatives can deter criminal activities and enhance community safety.
3. **Local Vigilante Groups:** In areas with limited formal security presence, local vigilante groups often emerge to fill the gap. While their operations must be regulated to prevent abuses, these groups can provide valuable intelligence and support to official security agencies.
4. **Public Awareness Campaigns:** Educating the public about the importance of reporting suspicious activities and the mechanisms for doing so can enhance civilian participation in intelligence gathering.

Challenges to Community-Based Intelligence

Despite its potential, CBI faces several challenges in Nigeria:

1. **Mistrust Between Communities and Security Agencies:** Historical abuses and lack of accountability have eroded trust between communities and security forces, hindering cooperation.
2. **Fear of Reprisal:** Civilians may hesitate to provide information due to fear of retaliation from criminal elements or insurgents.
3. **Lack of Incentives:** Without adequate recognition or support, community members may be reluctant to participate in intelligence activities.
4. **Inadequate Training and Resources:** Community members and local vigilante groups often lack the necessary training and resources to effectively gather and report intelligence.

Strategies for Enhancing Community-Based Intelligence

To overcome these challenges and enhance CBI, the following strategies are recommended:

1. Building Trust: Security agencies must engage in community outreach programs to rebuild trust and demonstrate their commitment to protecting civilians.
2. Protecting Informants: Implementing measures to safeguard the identities and safety of informants can encourage more civilians to come forward with information.
3. Providing Incentives: Offering rewards or recognition for valuable intelligence contributions can motivate community members to participate in security efforts.
4. Training and Capacity Building: Providing training and resources to community members and local vigilante groups can improve the quality and reliability of the intelligence they provide.
5. Legal Frameworks: Establishing clear legal guidelines for the operation of community-based security initiatives can prevent abuses and ensure accountability.

Engaging local communities and harnessing grassroots intelligence play a crucial role in tackling Nigeria's internal security issues. By tapping into the unique insights of residents and encouraging active collaboration between communities and security forces, Nigeria can significantly bolster its intelligence functions, paving the way for a safer society. Nevertheless, to fully unlock the potential of community-based intelligence (CBI), it is vital to overcome current obstacles. This includes building trust among community members, ensuring the safety of informants, offering meaningful incentives, enhancing training and resources, and establishing strong legal frameworks to support these efforts.

Successful Intelligence-Led Security Operations in Nigeria

Examining how credible intelligence has played a crucial role in strengthening internal security operations reveals important insights into effective practices and key lessons. In this section, we will explore notable case studies from Nigeria that illustrate how gathering and utilizing intelligence can lead to successful outcomes in security efforts.

Operation Lafiya Dole, launched in 2015, was a major military campaign aimed at eradicating Boko Haram insurgents from the northeastern states of Borno, Yobe, and Adamawa. The operation heavily relied on intelligence provided by local communities, the Civilian Joint Task Force (CJTF), and other security agencies. The CJTF, composed of local volunteers familiar with the terrain, played a crucial role in gathering actionable intelligence on insurgent movements and hideouts. Their collaboration with the military led to the recapture of several territories previously under Boko Haram control. The success of Operation Lafiya Dole underscores the importance of integrating community-based intelligence into formal security operations (Wikipedia, 2025).
