#### **Research Paper Publishing Policy**

AJSBS publishes Research Articles, Case Studies, Review Articles, Reports, etc., written in English by interested scholars and researchers in the academic community, industry, and other establishments. All manuscripts received will be “double blind” peer-reviewed. Papers that are found publishable will eventually be considered for publication. The paper must be the original work of the author(s) that has not been published and is not undergoing review elsewhere.

#### **Publication Frequency**

The AJSBS currently observes a rolling publishing process whereby issues are published continuously. Each journal issue is published collectively as part of a single issue, accompanied by its own Table of Contents. The AJSBS currently only publishes online.

#### **Privacy Statement**

The names and email addresses entered in this journal site will be used exclusively for the stated purposes of this journal. They will not be made available for any other purpose or to any other party without a written request from the contributor.

#### **Manuscript Preparation Guidelines**

1. The manuscript should be typed on A4 Paper, double-spaced, not exceeding 25 pages (8,000 words), including tables, figures, and references, with a 25mm (1 inch) margin all around (Left, Right, Top, and Bottom) using 12-point Times New Roman.
2. It should have a cover page indicating the title of the paper/article and the details of the author(s), including affiliation, email address, and telephone number.
3. The first text page of the paper should have the title of the paper and the abstract. The name(s) of the author(s) should not appear on this page, and the abstract should be single-spaced, not exceeding 250 words.
4. All tables, diagrams, results, etc., should be numbered sequentially and in the order in which they are referred to in the text.
5. Submissions should be made only in MS Word for easy editing.

#### **Referencing**

References cited in the paper should follow the American Psychological Association (APA), 7th edition format.

#### **Submission and Review Procedure**

Electronic copies of the manuscript should be sent by e-mail to: [ajsbs2016@gmail.com](mailto:ajsbs2016@gmail.com), or hard copies can be submitted/mailed to the Deputy Editor or the Managing Editor.

A review fee of N10,000 (20USD for foreign authors) should accompany all manuscripts before they can be reviewed. Upon receipt, the paper will undergo internal checks for suitability before being reviewed by a “blind peer.” After the review, the manuscript may be returned to the author(s) to effect the needed corrections.

Each accepted paper attracts a publication fee of N20,000. This must be paid before the paper is published. Payments can be made either through direct bank transfer or bank draft into the journal's account details, which will be communicated to authors upon receipt of their manuscripts.

The submission of a manuscript implies an understanding that the paper is not currently under active consideration for publication elsewhere. Once accepted, the author(s) cede the copyright to the Faculty of Social Sciences, Imo State University, Owerri, the publisher of AJSBS.
